Key Findings

- 1) Body Worn Cameras shall be used for ... "(r) all calls for service." (Chapter 41.3.10; paragraph 9)
 - If an officer is on a scene (10-97), including a 21 or a 62A, the officer should have a video for that item number.
- For example, an officer responding to a 62A goes 10-97 and goes 10-31 or NAT (no sign), should have a video because the officer cannot know that they will not encounter a suspect, a victim, or witness in the process of the search.
- 2) In the case of two officer cars, the second officer sometimes did not take video at all or not for all of the calls. From the documentation on the Daily Activity Reports it is unclear if the second officer exited the vehicle. Nonetheless, the second officer should have turned their camera on.
